The average monthly income for a family of three accessing food pantries in the FreestoreFoodbank network was \$818 or \$9,816 yearly. 94% have monthly incomes below the Federal Poverty Level; an income below \$1,375.

Only 57% of the population served by the foodbank's partner agencies receive Food Stamps, although all appear to be categorically eligible. Their monthly Food Stamp allotment average \$212.74 monthly or \$7.09 daily.

- 41% were children under 18 years old
- 48% were adults between 18 and 59
- 11% were seniors age 60 and older
- 28% include at least one adult working in some capacity
- 12% indicated this was their first time at the pantry while 13% access services provided at least ten to 12 times a year
- 14% reported they attended college or a two-year technical school to further their education
